Key lessons learned

- Establish clear, consistent baseline data
- Solve the modeled mortality problem
- Improve measurement and data collection
- Ensure that common standards of measurement are used



Lessons learned, con't

- Set relative targets to complement fixed targets
- Set targets that are aspirational but also achievable
- Track specific coverage indicators and a composite coverage index
- Choose indicators carefully and balance focus with breadth



Countdown to 2030

Process for developing proposal

- Evaluation by independent consultants
- Post-2015 reference group
- Countdown leadership group consultations
- *Ad hoc* meetings (Kirkland, June Summit)
- July Countdown Coordinating Committee consultation
- Rounds of internal discussion



Phased proposal

- Current Countdown is ending!
 - Launch of final report at GMNH conference
- Next steps
 - Transition phase: November 2015 — April 2016
 - New mechanism to launch ~ May 2016



Contents

- Consensus on key points
 - “Suprainstitutional” (leveraging the power of partnership)
 - Independent
 - Technical core coupled with strong dissemination
 - Retain global work, but focus more attention on regional and country-level activities



Scope of work

Global

- Continuation of Reports and Profiles
 - Input to the Independent Advisory Panel
- Technical streams of analytical work
 - RMNCAH plus nutrition
 - Linkages with other accountability efforts in other sectors (education, water and sanitation, etc.)



Scope of work

Regional and country level activities

- “Hub and spoke model”
 - Capacity building and technical assistance
 - Case studies, reports, and quality assurance
